PROGRAM INITIATIVES

- The Health initiative, a 3-year long investment by the Cooperative Extension Section (CES) in partnership with Experiment Station Section (ESS), has added value to the new partnership with the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation which is maturing rapidly. (bit.ly/CES Health)
- ECOP is working directly with Land-grant University energy specialists and educators to develop a strategic framework of priorities for Cooperative Extension.
- A new water security educational program is being developed for use by Extension professionals.
- ECOP and ESCOP support the National Integrated Pest Management (IPM) Coordinating Committee. The group formed to implement IPM components to the Crop Protection Program following changes in 2014-15.
- ECOP 4-H Leadership Committee is working to increase membership from 6 to 10 youth million by 2025.
- Under the guidance of the ECOP Program Committee, Cooperative Extension workshops will equip participants with sufficient proficiency in civil dialogue processes and race relations practices to train others in their respective states to join or initiate efforts to promote civil dialogue within their state and communities.
- Began preparations to share resources and programs to address the opioid epidemic.

PARTNERSHIPS

- ECOP Executive Director and Chair regularly meets face-to-face in Washington with agencies and non-governmental organizations to intensify efforts to establish and maintain relationships.
- The strategic alliance with ESS is solid with awareness of the value of Cooperative Extension on the rise within the scientific community.
- eXtension Foundation (<u>www.extension.org</u>) continues to evolve as a valuable partner to Cooperative Extension.
- Relationships with state and county non-governmental entities are rekindling.
- The Academic Heads Section/ESS/CES Communication and Marketing Committee in partnership with Cornerstone and kglobal has changed directions this year with results in the process of being measured.

ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- The National Impacts Database Committee is working on a major upgrade to the system (<u>www.landgrantimpacts.org</u>)
 with a newer platform and other changes that will yield higher quality impact statements and encourage more complete participation by Directors and Administrators. The ECOP National 4-H Committee has made great strides in developing and managing national 4-H policies.
- ECOP offered an innovative professional development opportunity at the National Extension Directors and Administrators (NEDA) Meeting with a focus on excellence in state and local programming and transforming CES into a member-driven organization.
- Initiated a comprehensive new administrator orientation, including webinars and onsite workshop.
- ECOP will continue to search for the new Executive Director of the Cooperative Extension System in 2018.
